When Deborah’s family decided to look for a rescue cat to adopt, one phone call to FOCR led to not just one cat but three cats joining the family. As well, Deborah found a rewarding passion.

So impressed with the work that FOCR did, Deborah decided to volunteer for them “just a couple of hours a week.” Deborah brought boundless energy and enthusiasm to the organization, as well as her amazing recruiting skills.

Deborah’s husband Ken Matheson was recruited to build numerous cat shelves, cat cages and cat homes. He is now known as Mr Katmandu.

But Deborah did not limit her recruiting abilities to family members. Using her gentle persuasive skill she had several of her friends agreeing to provide foster homes for “just a few weeks.” As it turned out, those friends either ended up adopting their foster cats or continued to provide foster homes as cats were adopted.

Did you know?

Did you know that a cat’s whiskers serve many purposes? The whisker’s primary use is to help a cat judge whether or not he’ll fit through an opening. A cat’s whiskers are roughly as wide as his body -- sort of a natural ruler. A cat’s whiskers automatically grow to the width of the cat. A fat cat will have very long whiskers while skinny cats will have shorter whiskers

Whiskers help the cat feel his way around. They are so sensitive that they can detect the slightest directional change in a breeze. That’s why a cat can move around a room at night and not bump into anything. The air currents in the room change depending on where pieces of furniture are located. As the cat walks through the room and approaches the couch, he’ll know which direction to turn based on the change in air current around the couch.

Whiskers can also indicate a cat’s mood. If a cat is angry or feels defensive, the whiskers will be pulled back. When the cat is happy, curious or content, the whiskers will be more relaxed and pushed forward.
